Prajakta Adsul: Hi Dr. Glasgow! One of the challenges that I've run into (and was brought up by presenters before) is in justifying "innovation" in a pragmatic study. It often to me is a clear case of "application of the theories/research that we know" in communities/contexts that need it. Could you please advise on how to negotiate this challenge?

Michelle Martin: I would love to hear your perspective on how we are successful in review when you may choose a theory that may not be the preferred/favorite theory of the reviewer.

Danielle Ostendorf: I love advice on submitting a NIH K award with a D&I training aim. I'm finding it difficult to write a specific aims page using D&I science, but with a smaller budget to support research costs.

Preeti Zanwar: It seems like the pragmatic research focus can be driven in large part by one's particular discipline (especially in terms of outcomes that one might be interested in). For example, I am interested in economic outcomes (costs, utility) - these outcomes may not be the right fit for example funding agency, PCORI. What agencies may have interest in health economic outcomes for pragmatic research?

Prajakta Adsul: Thanks Dr. Holtrop! Wish there were more of you in the study sections!

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Jodi Holtrop: Russ mentioned - I am on a partial government employee contract called an IPA with the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality (AHRQ). @Preeti - AHRQ is interested in economic research. There are economists on the two main study sections they have HEOR and HSRV

Rodger Kessler: PCORI is now more open to cost being studied, but not as a primary focus.

Jodi Holtrop: PCORI are interested in the resources it takes to implement at least.

Michelle Martin: As we do these projects in the clinical setting, we may not have the track record of working with our clinical partners as we might have with our academic partners. How best do we demonstrate that our clinical partners are fully invested beyond letters of supports?

Qing Li: How to specify the stage and framework of the pragmatic research starting in my K01 scored by CDC? Implementation issues could explain no effects of two RCTs to address intimate partner violence among pregnant mothers in nurse home visitation setting, a service delivery model. To plan an R34 adaption pilot study and an R01 cluster RCT, I conducted secondary analysis of data of one RCT with a focus on 1) a sensitive subgroup teen mothers and 2) mechanism of changes--- relationship education and vision exercise addressed the lack of a vision of commitment and monitored the change of commitment, early and upstream precursor. These steps help me find some effectiveness of relationship education in teen mothers. How to specify the stage and framework of the pragmatic research in my case? Preeti Zanwar: Thank you for your excellent suggestions Dr. Glasgow and Dr. Jodi.

Danielle Ostendorf: These are awesome suggestions Jodi! Thank you! How can I access example D&I K awards?

Preeti Zanwar: Are examples of NCI K funded applications available to examine for external to Anschutz campus.

Preeti Zanwar: In my experience it has been difficult get hold of NCI program officers by email. Any suggestions how we identify and reach them?

Jodi Holtrop: If you truly want to partner with clinical partners, you fund a percent of effort for the clinical partner. We almost always do this.

Preeti Zanwar: Additionally, K can only be submitted to NIA/NCI if you are within 10 years of your doctoral program, is this correct? Does this timeline also hold for AHRQ K awards?

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Alejandra: What recommendations would you give to an international doctoral student (DrPH in Epidemiology @Columbia U) looking to work on an Imp Science dissertation project (global mental health) and start thinking about potential funding sources for the near future? Are there any pilot funding mechanisms, for example?

Amanda Farr: Recent article from Dr. Felner about benefits to community partners in CBPR practices is a great place to start when thinking about partner involvement. How is this a truly equitable relationship?

Katy Trinkley: There is no timeline for AHRQ K awards

Preeti Zanwar: Thanks @Katy for no timeline for AHRQ K grant.

Jodi Holtrop: @Preeti - I think the rules are the same at AHRQ for timelines unless it is a mid-career award, but not for sure.

Rodger Kessler: if one is generating a PCORI application, patients as co-I is important, maybe crucial.

Rodger Kessler: Canadian partners and sites are acceptable to many NIH announcements
