



KATH Stevens: Hi, Y'all! Please comment on the overlay/overlap of community engagement and the "science of team science." In other words: What strategies from "investigative team facilitation" might apply to CE...especially with clinicians-as-stakeholders?

Randi Libbon: In my work setting we have done some feedback groups with patients and I was wondering if you have suggestions for making these the most helpful and useful.

Alexis Koskan: Question: Do you pay community advisors only when you have a grant-funded project?

Alexis Koskan: Or, do you have a U/P grant - to be able to pay them on a more sustainable basis?

Calmbach: we have a great stable pt advisory board, but they are all over 65: any suggestions on how to recruit and retain a younger group of participants?

Kelty Fehling: for recruiting and retaining younger folks, we make sure our meetings are at a regularly occurring time outside of work hours

Preeti Zanwar: For someone who has not connections or exposure yet to community stakeholders, typically 1) how does one go about finding them first (this is the first before engaging with them) and 2) how long one does take to get them to agree to be your partners on grants?

Preeti Zanwar: I was interested in building community-clinical stakeholders to improve access to and delivery of preventive care.

Ellie Brent: In a previous role, I ran a PAC with dialysis patients across 4 states. Since I had no way of knowing all of them, we had an "application" with a required recommendation letter from a clinic staff to help filter and get a sense of how they interact with fellow patients and their clinic staff. Very helpful. As for payment, we couldn't pay them but we had an annual retreat that they really looked forward to and all travel/expenses were paid for.

Mary Fisher: Another incentives comment: there are also non-monetary incentives such as invitations to trainings, invitation to apply for a board, asking them to write for an upcoming newsletter about the work they're doing and how others can be involved, etc.
